Key messages from Dr. Gardner, Medical Officer of Health

Simcoe Muskoka moves into Grey - Lockdown

- Our region moved into Grey Lockdown as of March 1. Since then, I have heard from local businesses, politicians, and community members about their very real concern about the impact this has on livelihoods, businesses, and physical and mental wellbeing. I understand and sympathize that the pandemic has been devastating for many.
- The Grey Lockdown is intended as a short-term emergency brake to prevent the possibility of a third wave.
- Our concern is that we are seeing increases in cases and outbreaks of the B.1.1.7 variant in Simcoe and Muskoka. The variants of concern (VOC) are far more contagious than the original COVID-19 strain and can result in more severe disease.
- Simcoe Muskoka has more confirmed cases of the U.K. variant and positive screens for a VOC than any other health unit. Currently, about 66% of our COVID-19 cases are either a confirmed case of the U.K. variant or a positive screen for a VOC awaiting confirmation.
- We are acting early and cautiously to minimize the impact of the VOC which has led to third waves elsewhere in the world.
- I know this brings little comfort to our business community. This is one of the heartbreaks of the pandemic. I will continue to listen to our business community, closely monitor our VOC case numbers and trends, and, as soon as it is safe to do so, I will ask the province to lift restrictions.

Vaccination clinic update

- Yesterday, we opened the first of our community vaccination clinics in Simcoe Muskoka. This is a momentous step to getting the pandemic under control which has only been made possible through the tremendous efforts of all our partners working to organize them. I'd also like to thank my staff who have worked tirelessly toward this.
- **Update:** Our vaccination appointments and waitlist for dates up to March 16, 2021 are now FULL. Those who are currently on the waitlist will be contacted by the Health Unit with an appointment date from March 10-16.
- The province of Ontario is opening a new booking system and call centre for vaccine appointments, which is expected to launch on March 15. We will provide more details about how to book via this new system as information becomes available.

- We recognize there are issues with getting through on the phones due to an increased volume of calls. We are working to address this and provide the best possible customer service we can and ask that you have patience as we work through these issues.
- We are still restricted by the amount of vaccine we receive weekly and, as a result, we do not have clinics in every community every day.
- A reminder clinics are open **by appointment only to priority groups**: Seniors 85+, Indigenous adults 55+ and their adult household members; adult recipients of chronic home care; and Very High Priority health care workers.
- It is important that eligible individuals who are booking appointments read about the required documents and procedures on our <u>website</u> so that their appointment can be honoured at the clinics. Those who don't meet the criteria will be turned away and no walk-ins can be accommodated.

In the last day:

- 34 people tested positive, 65 people recovered, and there were no new deaths.
- There were 14 new confirmed cases of the U.K. variant and 40 new positive screens for a variant of concern (VOC).

Currently:

- There have been 72 new cases reported to the Health Unit for the current week.
- 18 people are hospitalized for COVID-19.
- There are 28 ongoing outbreaks (workplaces: 13, institutional settings: 10, educational settings: 4, community settings: 1).
- There has been a total of 205 confirmed cases of the UK B.1.1.7 variant and a total of 378 additional cases have screened positive for a VOC.

Since the last Partner Update:

- We have reported 220 new cases, 304 recoveries, and 2 new deaths.
- There have been 31 new confirmed cases of the U.K. variant and 108 new positive screens for a VOC.
- There are 95 fewer active cases.
- There are 9 more active outbreaks compared to the same day last week.
- There was a 10% decrease in new cases reported during the week of February 21 compared to the previous week.

- 7,958 immunizations have been provided since the last Partner Update.

- There were 958 new cases, 1,090 resolved cases, and 17 deaths in the last day.
- There are a total of 552 confirmed cases of the U.K. variant, 27 cases of the South . African variant, and 3 cases of the Brazilian variant.
- A total of 668 people are hospitalized for COVID-19, 274 people are in intensive care • units (ICU) and 188 people are on ventilators.
- There are 535 ongoing outbreaks (health care settings: 170, workplaces: 127, • congregate living: 93, schools and child cares: 83, other settings: 62).
- The current effective reproduction number is 0.99. •

In the last week:

- There have been 7,590 new cases, 7,122 recoveries, and 121 deaths.
- There has been an increase of 157 confirmed cases of the U.K. variant, 18 cases of the South African variant, and 2 cases of the Brazilian variant.
- There are 347 more active cases compared to the same day last week.
- The average number of weekly cases is 1,084.

Vaccine status:

- A total of 754,419 vaccines doses have been administered to date, with 27,398 doses administered yesterday.
- 266,710 people in Ontario have been fully vaccinated.

- Areas with the highest number of active cases per 100,000 population:
 - Thunder Bay District (241.63), Peel (162.62), Brant County (149.69), and Toronto (121.91).
- Areas with the highest number of active cases:

Weekly Epidemiological Summary highlights: February 14-20, 2021:

- Confirmed cases of COVID-19 have continued to decline since early January 2021.
- The number of outbreaks in healthcare settings has been decreasing in recent weeks.
- The total number of outbreaks in educational settings increased by 94.1% compared to the previous week.
- A variant of concern has been identified by over 40% of public health units in Ontario.

Yesterday:

- Canada reported 2,457 new cases and 28 deaths.
- New cases were reported in all provinces and territories except NWT and YT.
- Deaths were reported in BC, AB, SK, MB, ON, QC, and NB.

Since the last Partner Update:

- In the last week, 20,478 people tested positive for COVID-19, 282 people died, and 20,620 people recovered.
- There are 4,992 fewer active cases of COVID-19 than there was a week ago.

Between February 16 and February 23, 2021:

- The number of COVID-19 patients hospitalized decreased from 1,956 to 1,729.
- The number of COVID-19 patients in ICU beds decreased from 601 to 575.
- The number of COVID-19 patients mechanically vented decreased from 340 to 303.

Weekly epidemiology update: February 14-February 20, 2021:

• New cases decreased by 10% compared to the previous week, with an average of 2,857 new cases every day.

- New deaths decreased by 26% compared to the previous week, with an average of 56 new deaths every day.
- Since early January 2021, daily case rates and the number of hospitalizations have decreased, while ICU admissions have remained relatively stable.
- Daily case rates remain highest among those 20-29 and 30-39 years of age.
- According to forecasting, between 861,120 to 900,630 cumulative reported cases and 21,770 to 22,760 deaths are expected by March 7, 2021.

Key vaccine updates: As of February 20, 2021

- 2.86% of the population has received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, including:
 - o 14.10% of adults aged 80 or older;
 - o 47.81% of health care workers targeted for priority vaccination, and;
 - $\circ~$ 67.49% of adults living in group living settings for seniors.
- 1.14% of population have received both required doses of the vaccine.

In the last day:

Highlights from Weekly Epidemiological Summary as of February 28, 2021:

- The number of new COVID-19 cases increased for the first time in 7 weeks, with a 7% global increase in cases compared to the previous week. This could be related to the continued spread of VOCs, relaxation of public health measures, and fatigue adhering to public health measures.
- The number of reported new deaths continues to decline, with a 6% global decline in new deaths compared to the previous week.
